THE VICTORVILLE CEMETERIES

The site of the original cemetery in Victorville was located on the hillside in back of the American Legion Hall, which was on Ninth Street at that time and is now known as Hesperia Road. The building is now occupied by the United Pentecostal Church. This cemetery is where people were buried prior to 1916. At that time, The Appleton Land and Water Company donated five acres of property on 11th and C Street and that was the beginning of the new cemetery. In later years, the Appleton Land and Water Company deeded sixteen acres to the cemetery, which is now known as Victor Valley Memorial Park. In 1917, the remains from the evident graves were moved from the old cemetery to the new cemetery. Robert Turner has the distinction of being the first person to be buried in the new cemetery. Mr. Turner was one of the early pioneers and was the grandfather to Robert P. Turner and Peggy Hillman.

Cumbria, England Births, Marriages, and Deaths Online is a new website providing original registrar's birth, marriage, and death register indexes for the districts in Cumbria where civil registrations began in 1837. Although the *indexes are not yet complete* for all years and districts, we hope that the database will eventually cover all Cumbria births, marriages and deaths from 1837. Thanks to Northwest Indiana Genealogical Society TWIGS and "Eastman's Online Genealogy Newsletter" for this link.

You are going to find a plethora of articles, both in your regular subscription magazines and your genealogical magazines and some of the journals with regard to the sesquicentennial of the Civil War and Civil War records and researching. The current YVGS Family Finders April 2011-Volume 29, No. 4, (Yucaipa Valley Genealogical Society) has six and one-quarter pages dedicated to Civil War cooking and recipes. Automobile Club of Southern California's Westways Magazine has an article "Places of Honor" by Eric Lucas. Family Chronicle, July/August 2010 had an article "Researching Little Battles and Skirmishes" by David A. Norris. The most interesting website for professional articles and research that I found and want to share with you, however, was that of the National Archives. If you copy and paste the following link, you will get to the site for the Prologue index site. The Prologue is the quarterly of the National Archives and you will find very interesting articles about a variety of subjects. For the Civil War, specifically, this link will take you to the index where you can search the various issues for Civil War articles by year of publication. Very simple and easy. You will also find numerous other articles of interest relative to your research.

A wonderful resource book for Genealogists. It covers the United States, Canada, some International information and Veterans Affairs Facilities. Sections include U. S. Funeral Homes, Canadian Funeral Homes, and International Funeral Homes. There is a section of yellow pages containing lists of those firms whose primary business is aiding the funeral director with final disposition. Included here are Autopsy/ Pathology Service, Cremains Scattering Services, Remains Disposal at Sea, Crematories, DNA Retrieval, and Organ Tissue Procurement. Next section is U. S. Cemeteries where active cemeteries are listed by State, the City, and then Firm Name. Firm listing include physical address and phone/fax information. The last section is a listing of Daily Papers that include obituaries. This again is by state alphabetically.

This is the official Criss Cross City Directory for Pomona, Claremont, La Verne, San Dimas including separate section for Chino and contiguous areas. This is an alphabetical Directory of Business concerns and residents indicating owners, officers or managers of businesses; marital status of individuals, occupations, employment connections, home addresses, and telephone numbers. It is also a complete classified business directory listing businesses and professions, organizations, churches, schools, hospitals, libraries, office and public buildings, etc. A valuable tool for locating families during this period.






