


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The Benton Donation

"Although the booth featured a wide array of many bestselling titles published by Genealogical Publishing Company and Clearfield Company, clearly the favorites this year were the several <u>Genealogy at a Glance</u> and <u>Quick Sheet</u> titles. These laminated four-page sheets are attractive because they provide concise, useful information, are reasonably priced, and best of all, weigh almost nothing, thus making them the perfect resource to include when preparing for a research trip."

"The most popular of the *Quick Sheet* topics proved to be *The Historical Biographer's Guide to Cluster Research (the FAN Principle)* (Genealogical Publishing Co., 2012), which quickly sold out thanks to its being mentioned in various speakers' lectures. In this title, Elizabeth Shown Mills shares her view that "to prove identity, origin, and parentage, [a researcher should] study individuals in the context of their 'FAN Club' Family, Associates, and Neighbors." If you don't have a copy of this title, you are missing out on an interesting concept and methodology that will certainly prove helpful in your brick wall research." ...

Are you wondering which of the State 1940 Census have been indexed? How about which states are available to index? Family Search has a neat visual map that shows the progress being made on the Community Census Project. Go to Family Search.org and click on the 1940 Census Community Project Illustration in the top right hand corner. The link will take you directly to the map. If you hover over the state, a pop-up will show you how much of the Census is complete. If you fill in the blanks, you can find out if the county or city you want has been completed. If you click on the state, a scroll-down on the page, you will hit a thumbnail history for the state, a list of prominent people on the census, as well as a list of organizations and Gen. Societies who are indexing that site. There are also links to state specific websites, databases, and Wiki articles that will be helpful in your research.

Many are aware that Ancestry.com has Mexican census records for review, but how would a person with Mexican ancestors find the descriptive sources that would tell something of how they lived? Thanks to an article in the "arts & Books section of the Christmas Day L.A. Times, it just so happens that the National Autonomous University of Mexico is planning on placing its entire collection of research materials on the internet at "Toda la UNAM en Lines." This includes photos, newspapers, student theses, legal opinions, and other items that can be expected to name ancestors. The French and Indian War (1754-1763)

With the fourth of July around the corner, I did a search for something on or about the Revolutionary War. Instead I discovered this documentary done by PBS. For those with Colonial Ancestors, this may be of interest.

From the Website: ""The War That Made America" brings to life a vastly important—but often misunderstood—period of American history, a period that set in motion forces that would culminate in the American Revolution. The dramatic documentary tells the story of the French and Indian War (1754-1763), which began in the wilderness of the Pennsylvania frontier and spread throughout the colonies, into Canada, and ultimately around the world."

This is a great website, containing Historical Notes, a Flash Timeline, Biographies of key figures, and a list of Additional Readings, both published and online. There is a media center where you can view program promos, music and maps that were used during the series.

The documentary is available through PBS, Amazon, EBay, and others. You pay a few dollars more from PBS but also support them. I have the Revolutionary War series produced by them and it is outstanding. I know very little about the French and Indian War. For instance, a young 22 year old George Washington led a British patrol and his Indian allies into the Pennsylvania back country. Read what happened that day in May 1754 on the website. It was the beginning of the French and Indian War. &
