The Hi Desert Genealogical Society was organized in 1976 and held their monthly, meetings at Victor Elementary School for 17 years. In March of 1993 the meetings were moved to the Victor Valley Museum on apple Valley Road, Meetings moved to the Jess Ranch Community building, then moved to an office building (I don't remember the buildings name, but it was very small and we had to crawl over the office furniture) and finally moved to the Elks Lodge on Hesperia Road.

I think I started attending in Sept. of 1993; when Eric Ericson started his second term as president. At this time I felt that we needed some cookies at the meeting, and by March of 1995 I had a cookie committee consisting of Betty Rhoades, Jean Lundgren, Edie Jensen, Erlyene Adams and myself.

Our first project was Foods of the World, which consisted of one country, or region, and we prepared desserts from that area. We did this until December of 1998, and then prepared regular cookies and desserts.

I have spoken about Facebook for Genealogists. But here is something I never considered, Twitter? Never have had a twitter account and never intended on tweeting. However, Gena's article in this month's *Internet Genealogy* is intriguing. Her article is titled "20 Groups You Should Follow on Twitter".

Gena begins: "ARE YOU USING TWITTER? The social media website Twitter is a great tool for genealogists. Microblogging provides a forum for researchers to spread the word about ancestors they are researching, read what other individuals and organizations are doing as well as attend conferences and society meetings virtually."

The article goes on to discuss the types of accounts to follow: Libraries, Archives, Websites, and of course Subscription services such as; Ancestry, MyHeritage, GenealogyBank, etc. Did you know the Library of Congress has a Twitter account? The library "tweets" what is new as well as upcoming historical events. What about the National Archives or for those researching England, the National Archives UK, they all "tweet". I cannot list all twenty here but suffice it to say they are all interesting. Take a look at your favorite places on the web and see if they have a twitter account, the results may surprise you. Create your own list and start receiving those "tweets".

If you follow Gena's page on GenealogyWise <http://www.genealogywise.com/profile/GenaPhilibertOrtega> you may already know about Twitter as a possible source for genealogists. New Search Engine

Narrow your Search !

Have you heard of "Million Short"? It is a new Search Engine that lets you search less common websites. It is ideal for those of us looking for ancestral records because archived ancestral records are often found in the obscure corners of the internet.

The name is derived from the fact that it can ignore the one million most popular websites. Actually it gives you more options than that. Access the site and next to the Search window is a drop down menu. The drop down menu gives you six options; remove the top million sites from the search, the top 100 thousand, the

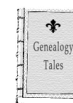
top 10 thousand, the top 1 thousand, the top 100, and last but not least, don't remove any sites.

I tried this out by doing a search for my gg-granduncle, "Joseph S. Luther civil war". I removed the one million sites, was presented with one page of various sites and did not see anything of interest. However, in a column

on the right I was presented with a list of 130 sites that had been removed from my search and I could include them if I chose to do so. I searched again by removing the top 100 thousand and found "Cards Records of Headstones Provided for Union Civil War Veterans 1879 - 1903 ... Luther Joseph S: Pvt: D: 40 MA Inf: Bristol: MA: 1864: 5: Aug. 21, 1888. That was him! An interesting site that can help remove the pages and pages of non relevant material presented when one goes searching on the net. Give it a try at:

Evernote

Remember Everything

As writers and genealogists we are always making notes and collecting various types of information, webpages, screenshots, documents, photos, etc. How do you save and manage the info? I use Microsoft OneNote, but here is an alternative, Evernote, and it is in "the cloud"

where you can access at any time you have web access.

Create a note; text, part of an email, or webpage and store it in a notebook. Create different notebooks for different projects (or surnames). Beginning to sound familiar, like OneNote? However, Evernote Basic is free. You can also create "stacks" that will hold several notebooks so you can group your notebooks. It gets better, you can move things around, rename, delete, tag with keywords to search later. Drag and drop features let you add photos or images. You can attach Word or PDF files with a paperclip option. To save web content, install Evernote's Web Clipper and follow the directions. Highlight what you want to save a click a button (again similar to OneNote). With additional apps you can collect audio files as well. Evernote is compatible with Windows or Mac and most mobile devices. When on the web, regardless of device, Evernote will synchronize your data every few minutes. You can also sync manually, makes no difference what type of device you are working with.

A free account is limited to 100,000 notes each limited to 25 mb (60 mb/mo), up to 250 synced Notebooks; and email up to 50 notes per day. Premium version \$5/mo or \$45/yr with more capacity and options.

Editor's Corner

Today's Technology

Those of you, who have heard me speak about "One Note", Digitizing records, Google, and Facebook, know that I do not shy away from "technology". That being said, I have never seen the need for me to have a smart phone an Ipad or an Ipad.

We recently had a garage sale in Big Bear. I sold my Kayaks and much more. What to do with this "found money"? I bought a tablet. I am not an Apple fan, so after some research, I decided on a Samsung Galaxy Tab 2 10.1. In light of the recent lawsuit, I guess I chose well. The Samsung is available at Costco, cost much less than an Ipad and has the ability to add additional memory via a micro sd card like those used in cameras. It is powered by Android 4.0 and has an unbelievable number of Apps (applications) available, including many related to genealogy.

I recently added a leather portfolio with a Bluetooth keyboard. Now it's like having a small laptop. I opted for the wifi model so I only have internet access when a wifi hotspot is available. Since it has a forward and reward camera, there is no need to take my camera to the library. Photo quality is not as good as a good camera though. By adding a 32 gb SD card I now have the majority of my genealogy files on the tablet and I can sync it with my laptop should one or the other change. I have a cable to attach a flash drive for specific projects. It is loaded with software to create or edit MS Office documents

Let's talk Apps. For those of us that use Legacy there is an application by TelGen called "Families". I now have my Legacy genealogy on my tablet. I can do most

anything on my tablet that I can do on my PC and Sync the two together. I can have multiple family files, create new files, edit files. For those who do not have Legacy there is GedStar Pro. GedStar converts directly from "The Master Genealogist" and "Legacy Family Tree", or from a GEDCOM file. It displays all your data including events, notes, sources, repositories, and photos. Some product-specific features are also available, such as the research log or to-do list. While you cannot edit the current data, you can create to do lists and make notes to yourself. I have both because GedStar is easier to navigate and see the data in a clearer format. Of course Ancestry.com has an app available, Find Grave, as well as Family Search Indexing for indexing while on the go, others include how to's and several Family Tree apps including Family Bee. While many apps on the tablet are free, most of the applications for genealogy have a nominal fee associated with them.

In the Feb-Mar issue of *Internet Genealogy*, there is an article entitled "Tablets and Your Genealogy". If you do not own a tablet and are thinking of buying one, this article is worth reading. *Internet Genealogy* is a magazine I came across while researching tablets. It is published by Moorshead Magazines Ltd. They also publish *Family Chronicle*, *History Magazine*, and many other topical publications. The current issue lists "50 top sites for Genealogy Research", reviews on several apps and an article by Gena Philibert-Ortega on using Twitter. *Internet Genealogy*, is worth a look at; <https://internet-genealogy.com>. It is available in hard copy as well as a PDF version to download and read on your PC or other device.

Back to the tablet, you can't beat it for portability and connectivity. I rarely use my laptop anymore. Internet and email are checked more often. Maybe now I will get more work done on my gg-grandfather's biography. If you have an interest in a tablet, see me at the general meeting and I will be glad to show you what I have. ☑
