The re-opening of the Apple Valley Library on 9 Sept saw the removal of our valued book collection. Prior to the reopening we were notified on Wed. Sept. 4th that we had to remove 65 boxes (18x18x16) of books by Friday Sept. 6th at 5:00 pm. Not much notice. This was done at the request of Leonard Hernandez County Librarian and Felicia Macomber, Apple Valley Librarian. Of our 3500 books a few hundred were "Cherry Picked" to augment the Reference Section of the Library. In order to keep the collection intact, members of HDGS removed the remaining books.

Knowing where we came from and remembering our heritage is an important part of who and why we are. For an individual to decide what is important for the community, based on what is pleasing to the eye, is a sad state of affairs. The community has lost a great research asset due to the callous disregard for the past by a few individuals.

We are currently working with County District Supervisor R. Lovingood and his staff in acquiring new space for our collection.

What is MyGenShare?

Reference and How To's

MyGenShare is a comprehensive digital library for genealogists. The digital library's million-plus indexed resources includes articles, eBooks, ePeriodicals, historical maps, podcasts, slideshows, videos, a genealogy links directory, and genealogy search engines. It is not a database full of records and names. It is an extensive collection of genealogy how-to resources on the internet.

A quick look at the website <u>www.mygenshare.com</u> reveals a plethora of information that may boggle one's mind. I suggest you look at the top of the site and click on the "Quick Access PDF Guide"

You can access portions of MyGenShare content for free or choose from several subscription offerings. Many subscription options are offered, including Everton's Genealogical Helper Magazine Subscription. Each published magazine has been digitally prepared and separated into individual, easily accessible content articles. You can also view the content as a PDF in its original published format. You can explore the collection through a keyword search, or simply browse by topic to find answers to your questions. Search by year, topic, or family name, and uncover or rediscover one of genealogy's valuable resources, Everton's Genealogical Helper Magazine. The Premium subscription includes everything and is reasonably priced at about \$50 per year or \$5.75 per month. Compare your options. Use the 7-day free trial to access the premium content and start finding answers.

Whether you are a beginner or seasoned Genealogist, MyGenShare may be worth taking a look.

I recently attended my 50th Hi-School reunion and struck up a conversation with a lady friend I have maintained contact with through Facebook. So, she knows my level of involvement with Genealogy.

We spoke about DNA testing. She is interested in what her origins, as well as her husbands, are. I offered to help her research her ancestors. Her response, "I am not interested in the details; I just want to know what we are". I was aghast! Here is a well educated woman, a teacher for over 30 years whose grandson asked the question "What are we?", and she is not interested in the detail! We dated, I thought I knew her, and she is not interested in the detail? I realize genealogy is not for everyone but how can one wonder what they are and not care about the detail? She and I will continue this conversation, if not for her, then for the grandson who asked the question.

I started to reflect on why genealogy is important and what made it important in my life. Genealogy certainly means different things to different people. However, there are some common threads that people share when looking toward the past. Some of the practical reasons why people get involved with genealogy are to:

- Validate Family Stories •
- Trace a Family Inheritance •
- Trace Land Ownership •
- Find Birth Parents •
- Prove Paternity
- Fulfill a Religious Tenet •
- Understand a Community History
- Preserve a Close Relative's Legacy •
- Preserve Family Traditions
- Preserve Family Culture •
- Understand Family Letters •
- Understand a Namesake •
- Reconnect with Family • And finally:
- Perpetuate a Family Legacy

My initial reason was to validate family stories. In 1999 my Mom was under hospice care at my sister's home in Arizona. Two of my Aunts were there to help with her care. During the last few days of Mom's life I listened to stories about the family for the first time; the grandmother who spoke funny (Quaker) who was raised by her grandmother over a pub in England; the

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Grandfather who remarried, traveled to America with his new wife and left three children with relatives in England never to be reunited. I heard about my grandfather's boat with the fake bottom so he could run liquor up the Tauton River during prohibition to make ends meet for a family of nine children. The stories intrigued me, I wanted to know more, and so my quest began.

In 2004 my son and I found the pub (The Swan Inn) in Chapel en le Frith, Derbyshire where Mary Hannah Hibbert was raised by her grandmother, Hannah. George Fidler's one regret in life was that he never reunited with the children he left behind, but I know their story too.

As I investigated my paternal side I discovered my connection with Colonial America and the Plantagenet family of English Royalty through Mary Abel, my eighth g-grandmother, wife to Elder Samuel Luther, son of Capt. John Luther who emigrated from Dorset, England in the 1630's. I continue my search now to perpetuate the Family Legacy. A legacy filled with commitment, a sense of duty and rich in history. I want my grandchildren to know and to feel that connection to the past and those ancestors who persevered to make this world a better place for those who followed.

The practical side of genealogy is easily understood. There is also a philosophical side to genealogy. That basic human curiosity of where do I come from, why am I here, where am I going; three questions that all major religions seek to answer. Each of us is the end product of generations that have come before. A glimpse at those generations helps answer the what and more importantly the who am I.

"Genealogy is history on a personal scale. It helps satisfy a deep need to understand how we fit into the broader world around us. Genealogy is more than just a collection of single family threads passing through time. It truly is a journey of many lifetimes woven together from the past, the present and (from our perspective) the future."

The Encyclopedia of Genealogy is created by genealogists like yourself. In fact, YOU can help by adding content: your own knowledge and expertise can help others. If you see anything in this encyclopedia that is incorrect, YOU can change it! If you see anything that is incomplete, YOU can add to it! If you note anything that is missing, YOU can add it! This encyclopedia will succeed because people like you contribute nuggets of information. When enough "nuggets" are added, the Encyclopedia of Genealogy will become a gold mine.

NOTE: This encyclopedia is not a place to find all the ancestors of John Doe or all the descendants of John and Mary Smith. The World Wide Web already has many online message boards and databases that perform that function well. Instead, the Encyclopedia of Genealogy serves as a clearinghouse of genealogy techniques: where to find records, how to organize the data found, what the terminology means, and how to plan your next research effort.
