## George M. Noyes

<u>George M. Noyes</u> was the son of Henry A. Noyes and Lucy Jones and the grandson of Elizabeth Jones.<sup>i</sup> Henry and Lucy were married in Nevada County in 1876.<sup>ii</sup>

Henry Noyes came from Maine and was a miner at Quaker Hill. He was likely related to other Noyes families from Maine who settled at Quaker Hill. One of them—John A. Noyes--was murdered. Some of them are mentioned in Thompson & West: *The History of Nevada County, 1881*.

George's father, Henry A. Noyes, died 3 Jan 1910.<sup>iii</sup> Henry's obituary mentions that George resided on Clay St. George Noyes and his mother, Lucy, are listed in the 1910 phone book at 337 Clay Street.


George's widowed mother, Lucy Jones Noyes, married Lewis Frank Mayo in 1911.<sup>iv</sup> Lucy died 30 Aug 1929.

George married Leone\_\_\_\_. They are shown together in the photo on the next page.

George graduated from Nevada High in 1894 and went on to be an engineer. He is most known for promoting a tunnel extending from Nevada City to Grass Valley to drain the mines. Bob Paine, local history writer, described George's plans for the tunnel:

"In 1908 he proposed boring a long tunnel from a point near Jones Bar, on the South Yuba River, at an elevation of 1,050 feet, in a southeasterly direction along the contact between the schistose diabase rocks on one side, and the massive granites on the other through a formation which will be comparatively easy to bore; first to the principal mines of Nevada City, which lie adjacent to the contact; thence bearing south to intersect the mines of Grass Valley. This tunnel it is estimated will have an ultimate length of ten miles...."




passed away pesteriay morning at 8 o'clock, death being caused by rheu-matism and heart trouble. Mr. Noyes had been alling for several days, but his condition suddenly became worse during the carly morning and pothing could be done to prolong life. In the death of "Al" Noyes this community loses a good offizin, as he was a man of honor and integrity, genial and companionable, a hurd working man, and was held in the highest esteem by his legion of friends. For many years he was a trusted employe of the South Yupa Water Company. being a carpenter by trades A few years ago Mr. Noyes and wife sold their home at Town Talk and moved to town. Deceased was for terty years a resident of this vicinity and at the time of his death was aged sixty years, ning months and ten days, being a native of Maine. A wife and two sons, Elliont and George Noves, are left to survive him, besides other relatives. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the home of George Noyes on Clay street, and Rev. John M. Ramhurt will officiate. Interment will be in Pine Grove comotory.

The project never won the support of the big mining companies.<sup>v</sup>

George M. Noyes died 14 Jul 1962<sup>vi</sup>. His wife, Leone, died 30 Jul 1966.
