



FOREWORD





The Student Controls, one for the girls and one for the boys, have the job of keeping order on the campus and the surrounding grounds. Each control, consisting of twenty members, is composed of commercial, vocational, and academic students who are selected every semester. The girls' control is appointed by the First Vice President in consultation with the Dean of Girls, the boys' control, by the Commissioner of Welfare with the approval of the Dean of Boys. The purpose of the controls is "to maintain standards of conduct among students." The duties of the controls are to perform hall duty, to perform rally duty, and to keep order in the cafeteria. Each control meets once a week, and at these meetings offenders of school regulations are summoned to explain their side of the question and to be fairly tried by the Student Control. The decisions of the control are then sent to the Dean for their approval.




BLUE AND WHITE

JEEP - A - WEEK

Through the efforts of the entire student body and personnel, Stockton High carried on an exceptionally successful "Jeep A Week" war bond and stamp drive starting in January. The goal was to purchase enough stamps and bonds to pay for a jeep a week, but the first week found us with six purchased. The goal that S.H.S. set for the end of the school year, 52 jeeps, was reached in less than four months. At the publication of this book 55 jeeps have been purchased. J. Mitchell Lewis, J. W. Adamson, faculty members, and Colonel Churchill of the Stockton Ordnance Base must be given special praise for their work in the campaign.

TREASURY FLAG

In February Stockton High School received the Treasury Flag for over ninety per cent participation of the students and faculty in the sale of bonds and stamps. The percentage for January was ninety-three percent, for February ninety-one percent, and for May ninety-one and five-tenths percent. The percentage was kept up by selling stamps and bonds each Wednesday in the 10:35 classes. The Treasury Flag was presented at the last assembly in February. It is now displayed in the Main Hall, and we expect to keep it in the Main Hall, for we feel sure that the students will keep up the ninety percent.



BOOK DRIVE

More important than ever before, the Red Cross work under the Junior Red Cross has greatly increased during the past school year. The war has made necessary various drives for soldiers, prisoners of war, and victims of circumstances. Drives for buttons, books, needles, and junk jewelry, have been among the activities of the Junior Red Cross. The organization also carried on its traditional Penny Day collection and helped with the March of Dimes collection. A great deal of credit for this very successful year should be given to Miss McInnes, adviser of the organization.

PRE-FLIGHT CLASS

In September, for the first time a class in pre-flight aviation was offered to the students of Stockton High. Extremely valuable to those students who plan to enter the air forces, it too interests many students, both boys and girls with an eye for future flying after the war. This pioneer class is taught by Mr. Elder, science teacher, who took an extensive course in aviation last summer for preparation. The division of the pre-flight course are radio, navigation, meteorology, metallurgy and aeordynamics.

Goes to War

KEY DRIVE

National acclaim and an unexpected total of sixty-thousand keys were the results of the ten-day key drive by Stockton High students in Fall, 1942. The "Guard and Tackle" sponsored drive was expected to net only ten thousand keys. A fine job of publicity was done by the members of the "Gat" staff. They gave prizes to the highest contributors, supplied collection barrels and the huge "measuring" key. Names of students who collected more than twenty-five keys were printed in the school paper. Richard Burns, chairman of the drive, was largely responsible for the great success.

OUT IN THE FIELDS

Tomatoes, dirt, slacks, and bandanas were the most familiar sights seen by students of Stockton High from mid-October to mid-November of 1942. Because of the shortage of labor and the great need for tomatoes by the armed forces, we turned out in hundreds to do this work. School was dismissed shortly after noon, and students boarded trucks to go to nearby farms. Fifteen ranches, or more, were served by 981 students. There were 25 supervisors, most of them members of our own faculty. Mr. Cave, dean of boys, handled most of the organizing and administrative duties involved.




RED CROSS WORK SHOP

"Anything the Junior Red Cross asks us to do" sums up the duties of the Red Cross Workshop. The group doing the work is composed of sixteen girls under the direction of Miss Fowler, Home Economics teacher. The girls, all volunteers, work an hour a day and get classroom credit for their efforts. Some things that they have done were the making of bedroom slippers and utility bags for soldiers, card-table covers, preparing Christmas packages and boxes, decorating Christmas trees at the soldiers' hospital, and executing a successful button and needle drive at the school.

SERVICE FLAG

Three flags show the service that Stockton High boys have given their country. In the picture above the flag on the left shows the number of boys who fought in World War No. 1. This flag was the inspiration of Miss Minnie U. Howell, a member of the faculty at that time. The second flag is the new service flag presented by Miss Selna's senior adviser section. It is to be completed at the close of the war when final figures are available. Flag number three is also a replica of the First World War. During the last war it hung in the halls of Stockton High School with a blue star showing for each boy in the service.



Due to a late start in training because of Autumn harvesting and with only five varsity players returning, the Stockton High Tarzans got off to a poor start and consequently finished the season with only one win and several defeats. Modesto lost to the Tarzans by 19 to 7. Although the team as a whole did not fare so well, three of the first string players landed on one of the three All-Section Teams picked by the valley newspapers. These players all finished their high school football careers here this year. Art Bevette, ace right end, completed four years of football at Stockton High by being picked on the first All-Section Team, which is an honor bestowed on only the best valley pigskin players. Jack Bird, tough and consistent right guard, played one year "Bee" and two years of Varsity for the Tarzans. He topped his playing by playing on the second All-Section Team. Bill Bianchi, veteran, plunging back and another four-year man, was honored also by being named quarterback on the third team picked by the newspapers. Neil Holmes, center, although not placed on one of the All-Section Teams, finished an active four-season football career this year. Ray Padgett, starting his fourth year with the Tarzans, had his season interrupted when he enlisted in the Navy. Padgett's loss was a blow to the team as he had been an autstanding end. At the time of publication, plans for the 1945 season were still in doubt. Whether or not the Tarzans will compete against outside city teams next season has vet to be decided.






SWIMMING




